



Hints & Tips

Burnishers via Creations, and ebench newsletter.

Old needle files make great burnishers. The various shapes of files provide you with an almost endless assortment of different shaped burnishers. To make the burnisher, grind the teeth off the old file, being careful that you do not overheat it as you do not want to remove the temper from the metal. Then polish the metal to a high shine.



Tumbling. via Tulip City Conglomerate, by Tom Mueller. Use many different sizes of rocks when doing a batch in the tumbler. The small rocks help to polish the larger rocks. Do not use too many large rocks in the batch or none will polish nicely.

Muffin tins can be used for sorting and storing. They are neat and may be stacked up. Plastic bins with lids are handy for sorting trays of rocks.

Cushioning rocks in the tumblers is important especially during the polishing stages. Insufficient cushioning can cause rocks to scratch each other, rather than moving freely in the polishing agent and get a good shine. Plastic or ceramic pellets may be purchased for this purpose. These may be washed and used again but they must only be used in the same kind of grit or polish.

Harder Than Diamond

General Electric scientists announced the hardest substance ever made by man or nature, an entirely new material. It is a crystal hard enough to scratch a diamond and able to withstand twice as much heat. Named Borazon, it is expected to have far reaching impact on industrial polishing and cutting operations. In 1957 the inventor, Dr. Wentorf, started with boron nitride, commonly called white graphite which is very similar in appearance and feel to talcum powder.

Using pressure of about one million pounds per square inch and temperatures of over 3,000' F he changed the crystal structure from hexagonal to cubic, like diamond. While a diamond burns at 1,600' F, Borazon can withstand temperatures of up to 3,500' F.

Borazon became G.E's trademark in 1969. Editor
