

Copper

Copper has been used by man since prehistoric times, possibly as early as 6000 B.C. for tools, weapons and ornamentation. Heat makes copper more malleable and tempering was used as early as 5000 B.C. Bronze, an alloy of copper and tin, was first used around 2500 B.C. Brass, an alloy of copper and zinc was probably not fully developed until after 300 A.D. Biblical mentions of brass probably refer to copper or bronze.

About half of all copper used is for electrical equipment, (motors, generators, transformers, switchboards and current carrying devices). Next in order of usage are fabricated metal products, (valves, pipe fittings, plumbing fixtures metal stampings and hardware), then machinery, (refrigeration, pumps and compressors) and transportation, (1 car contains about 40 lbs and an airplane about 3,000 lbs). The most visible uses we see every day are pennies, plating plumbing and electrical phone wires.

Copper (continued)

Copper is an isometric mineral. Isometric crystals are composed of three axis of the same length and perpendicular to one another. Copper is valued for it's strength, malleability, ductility, corrosion resistance and it's ability to conduct electricity and heat. Evidence of copper mining in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan goes back to 5,000 B.C. Those once vast deposits of native copper are now largely depleted.

American copper was first produced at Simsbury, Connecticut in 1705 by colonists and mined on a small scale in Michigan in 1830 then on a large scale in 1843. Most copper produced in the U.S.A. now comes from Arizona, Utah or Montana in the form of low grade ore which must be concentrated, smelted and refined. Copper is alloyed with zinc in percentages from 10% (bronze coloured brass) to 40% (reddish brass). Tin is alloyed with copper in various percentages to form bronze.

U.S. nickels are 75% copper and pennies now are copper plated zinc. Copper silver alloys include sterling silver, German silver and Indian silver. Copper is also alloyed with arsenic, beryilium, silicon, phosphorus, lead and manganese.

Monel metal is an alloy of 67% nickel and 22% copper, used for household purposes and sinks. Pewter is made of 93% tin, 6% antimony and 1% copper.

Main Copper minerals include:

Native Copper

Sulfides: chalcopyrite, calcocite, bornite, energite.

Oxide: cuprite

Carbonates: malachite, azurite.

Phosphate: turquoise.

Additional: covelite, tetrahedrite, tennantite, chrysocholla, antlerite, brochantite,


