JUNE BIRTHSTONE

ALEXANDRITE MOONSTONE PEARL

People born in June can choose from one of three stones. Moonstone and Pearl are the traditional choice for the European people and Alexandrite for the North American people. Alexandrite is a relatively new addition to the birthstones list. Some people think that it was the give men a better selection as both Moonstone and Pearl are considered to be more for the ladies. Others think that it offers a faceted stone; Moonstone is usually cut as a cabachon.

Alexandrite is a form of **Chrysoberyl**. It was discovered in 1830 in the Ural Mountains of Russia. This area has long since been closed and now Alexandrite comes from Sri Lanka, Zimbabwe and Brazil. The dramatic color change of the Russian shows very little from these locations.

Alexandrite is a fascinating gem that changes color. It is green in daylight to red in incandescent light. It is the presence of Chromium that gives the stone its color.

Moonstone is a variety of **Feldspar**. The stone is famous for its pearly blue opalescence and bronzy iridescent shimmer. Moonstones can come in a variety of colors and ranges from transparent to translucent. The best Moonstones have a blue sheen, perfect clarity and a colorless body color.

Pearls are the product of **clams and oysters** (mollusks) living in tropical and subtropical seas, as well as fresh water lakes and rivers. Irritants, such as small pieces of food can become lodged in the inner tissue of the clam or oyster. The mollusk reacts by depositing layers nacre (mother-of-pearl).

In natural Pearls the foreign object enters naturally. In cultured Pearls, a very small piece of nacre is implanted in a three-year old oyster using a surgical procedure.

Pearls are soluble in weak acid. Since human perspiration is slightly acidic, pearls should be cleaned after each use to prevent corrosion.



DID YOU KNOW?

1. The Kentrosaurus, a dinosaur of the stegosaur family lived in Africa about 156-160 Million years ago (in the late Jurrasic Period). It was thought that this dinosaur had two brains. Imagine the excitement this discovery must have caused!

It had one small brain, the size of a walnut in its head, and a larger one in its rear (pelvic) area. Upon further study and a few years later the scientists decided that the rear brain was not a brain after all but a nerve controlling relay system. It controlled the hind legs and tail.

SHOP HINTS

1. Here is a simple method of removing tarnish from the surface of silver objects, and you can do it right on your stove. Put the sterling in an aluminum pan such as a flat cake pan, (one you don't require for baking anymore). Add water to cover the piece, squeeze some lemon juice into the water and heat gently. The tarnish will transfer from the sterling to the aluminum, using the mild acetic acid from the lemon as a vehicle, (some recipes suggest a weak vinegar solution). No amount of silver is lost in this method.
