WHAT IS THE ISLAND ZONE? By Murdo Smith

The Lapidary Rock & Mineral Society of British Columbia is divided into zones. There are four of them; the Vancouver Island Zone, the Interior Zone and the Kootenay Zone and the Northern Zone. Today The Lapidary Rock & Mineral Society of British Columbia is called the British Columbia Lapidary Society, sometimes British Columbia is called the British Columbia Lapidary Society, sometimes referred to as B.C.L.S. and was originally incorporated in 1955. Four years later, in 1959 the By-Laws were revised to more or less the present form. This was made necessary when the Lapidary Club of Vancouver was broken up as it had grown too big and several clubs were formed in 1958. These clubs wanted to retain some ties to further the objects of the Society and therefore the current format was devised.

The Island Zone (The Vancouver **Island Zone** - to give it it's full name) consists of six of the lapidary, rock and mineral clubs on Vancouver Island. The six clubs in the Island Zone are Ripple Rock (Campbell River); Courtney; Parksville; Port Alberni; **Cowichan Valley and Victoria Lapidary** & Mineral Society. They each appoint three delegates to the Zone, one per year, for a three year period, a senior delegate, an intermediate delegate and a junior delegate. Each of these clubs takes a two-year turn at being the Executive for the Island Zone: the club representatives being President. Secretary, Treasurer. For the years 2012-2013 VLMS provides the Island Zone Executive. The term commenced at the end of the August 2012 meeting and will continue to end of the August 2014 meeting.

The Island Zone clubs have three business meeting each year, one in the Spring normally during the VLMS Rock & Gem Show, one in the Summer usually in Black Creek and one in the late Fall usually in Parksville. These meetings are accompanied by a Potluck Lunch to get the meeting off to a good start.

In addition to these business meetings the Island Zone Clubs each take their turn to host a Gemboree each year. In the past this was usually held in June. However after the 2012 Gemboree the clubs considered that this had outlived its usefulness and decided to try a different time of the year as June was turning out to be a rather busy month. In 2013 it will be held at the end of July.

To facilitate the business of the B.C.L.S. and to make it more financially possible for as many Directors as possible to take part in it's operation the Zones elect a chairman and he/she represents them at the general meetings of the Society.

Let's look first at the objects, which are the objects of all our local clubs and see how the Society has attempted to fulfil them along with the Zones.

The Objects of the B.C.L.S. are:-

a) To promote and encourage the study, collecting, cutting, polishing and engraving of gemstones, minerals, rocks and other geological materials, as well as lapidary work generally. It was a hobby, not for the purposes of trade, industry or business.

b) To encourage exploration of British Columbia for lapidary material and to promote British Columbia finished and unfinished rocks and stones, thus creating greater interest in these. c) To promote and encourage closer association with and exchange of information between rock hobbyists and lapidary groups, and to stimulate interest generally in and disseminate knowledge of mineralogy and Earth Sciences;

d) To provide equipment, machinery and educational, scientific and recreational facilities for the use and benefit of members and persons interested in lapidary work for their instruction and enjoyment.

The Functions and Standing Committees are:-

Annual Gem & Mineral Show - Held on the Lower Mainland, usually in late summer or fall and open to all member clubs for participation. It fulfils objects (a), (c), and to some extend (d) by being a showcase of members activities and bringing them together to share in information and fellowship. Members also have the opportunity to purchase equipment, supplies and finished jewellery from dealers, who carry a wide variety of materials from around the world.

Annual Rendezvous - This is the annual meeting of the Society and is held in the Interior of the Province. It includes in addition to the Annual Meeting, field trips, rock auction, displays, demonstrations and a dinner. This event is often held in smaller communities and brings exposure of the hobby to local people in centres away from the heavily populated areas of the cities. It also allows members to collect materials from places they would not otherwise have access to. **Summer Camp** - Held during July or August. This event was begun to answer object (b) and (c). Generally a week long camp-out held in various parts of B.C. and sometimes the Yukon, Alberta, and once the State of Washington. The Summer Camp gives members a chance to explore different parts of the country, collect and search for rocks, fossils, minerals, etc. and hopefully find new locations and new materials. The fellowship of evening campfires leads to many long term friendships.

Rockhounder Magazine – This publication has taken the place of a publication that was known as Quarterly Newsletter.

A number of other features are available from or through the Society. A description of these can be made available in a future article if there is interest in this.

SHOP HINTS

Polishing in tight areas can be very difficult. It can be quite easy if you make your own polishing points. Remove cotton ends from cotton swab. Then, using an abrasive disc in a flexshaft, narrow the ends to a point. Use one cotton swab to apply a small amount of polish compound to the area you want to polish and mount another in the flexshaft handpiece, sticking out about an inch. To get a high shine, use a new dry swab to finish polishing.


DID YOU KNOW
