

SHOP HINTS

1. Do you need 2 cabs exactly the same size? Glue two slabs together with paper between them. Cut to size. Separate the cabs by soaking them in water.

2. Good old Elmer's Glue mixed 50/50 with warm water works wonders at maintaining that "wet look" on all types of materials, including most shells. Just brush it on and let it dry if it gets dusty or dulled simply soak it in warm water and reapply. I learned this technique from one of my mentors when I wanted to display some petrified wood that looked great when wet but looked like a plain old rock dry.




ROCKS

Some coins or stamps or swizzle sticks, Antiques, retro, modern. Really, you can take your pick. Me, I've got a thing for rocks. And wherever I may be I pick up a rock along the way. Maybe even two or three. I write the date and locale on them To recall the place for me. And each becomes a sort of bookmark That represent a memory. I keep them in a bowl at home, Digging through them now and then; As they are tangible reminders Which take me back again To people and to places Which through the years I've known. And a host of moments that I cherish Cherish more than precious stones. These rocks have no commercial value Yet, they're priceless, don't you see. For they catalogue my lifetime and each contain a memory.



WULFENITE



Think about your collection. Do you have a specimen that is your favourite? One, that if you could only keep one thing from your collection, this one would be it? For me, it is a wulfenite specimen. I don't know what attracts me to wulfenite, but this one particular specimen of wulfenite would be the one I would keep over all the minerals I have.. Believe me. I have a lot of specimens to chose from. This particular specimen isn't very big or even the most expensive but mention wulfenite and this specimen instantly pops into mind. It is a very thin bladed and orange-yellow colour that is very appealing to me.


What is wulfenite?

Wulfenite is secondary mineral found in the oxidized zones of hydrothermal lead deposits in places such as Austria; Pribam, Czech Republic; Mapimi, Mexico; Australia and the Red Cloud Mine in Arizona, among other places. Wulfenite is the raw ore mineral for molybdenum.

Wulfenite must have been known for

some time as it had several names before its present one. It wasn't until 1845 when it was first described that it was named for an Austrian mineralogist named Franz Xavier von Wulfen and officially discovered.

The chemical composition for wulfenite is $Pb(MoO_4)$. It has a tetragonal system with crystals that can be stubby, pyramidal or tabular. It can also come in granular masses.




Its colours can vary from bright orange-red, yellow-orange, yellow, yellowish gray, olive green, brown and even black. It is rarely colourless. The luster is adamantine, sub adamatine or resinous. It can be transparent, translucent or opaque in diaphanity. On the Moh's scale of hardness it is 2 ½ - 3. Some wulfenites will fluoresce a yellow, orange or red in Low Wave lighting.

Uses for Wulfenite

Wulfenite is used as metallic hardener in steel along with chrome. It also helps

in resisting corrosion. As a source for lead it is used in batteries, paint and children's toys made in China.

Wulfenite is one of the favourite minerals for collectors.



Crystal meaning

Wulfenite is the stone of originality bringing new ideas and concepts to visual, written and other creative artists. It harmonizes emotions and clears emotional blockages. Wulfenite helps in healing the reproductive system and revitalizes all body systems.
